Kitka is a women's vocal ensemble unlike any other. These sophisticated singers blend a contemporary sensibility with specialized vocal techniques from Eastern Europe that have been distilled over centuries. Using only the pure unaccompanied voice, they create a constantly shifting landscape of sound, pulsing with angular rhythms, where dramatic dynamics leap from delicate stillness to shattering resonance, and seamless unisons explode into lush incomprehensible chords.

Kitka's material ranges from ancient village duets to complex choral works, from early music to contemporary theater. The sound of their voices is exotic, both ethereal and earthy. The melodies are hauntingly beautiful. The many languages in which they sing are largely unfamiliar to American ears — Albanian, Armenian, Bosnian, Bulgarian, Serbian, Croatian, Georgian, Hungarian, Ladino, Latvian, Macedonian, Romanian, Russian, Ukrainian, Yiddish, with the occasional Corsican, medieval Gallician, or ancient Greek. It is exactly this unfamiliarity that is so riveting, as Kitka's sensitive precision lifts their work out of the merely musical into a universe beyond words, an experience that is primal, elemental.

More than just a concert, an evening with Kitka unites vibrant music, enhanced by a subtly changing stage picture, compelling song introductions, and each singer's warm rapport with the audience.

This is powerful music by accomplished musicians who offer more than just exquisite execution—these women clearly share a passion for what they do. Kitka: powerful female voices uniquely blended in exquisite dissonance and harmony.

MISSION AND HISTORY

Kitka began in 1979 as a grassroots group of singers from diverse backgrounds who shared a passion for the stunning dissonances, asymmetric rhythms, intricate ornamentation, lush harmonies, and resonant strength of Eastern European women's vocal music. Kitka has deep ties to Eastern Europe and has traveled there to perform and collect repertoire many times. Kitka has sung in prestigious venues and festivals and has conducted research in rural villages in Bulgaria, Ukraine, Macedonia, Poland, Georgia, and Armenia, as well as in ethnic communities across America. Kitka also hosts several East European folk song masters as artists-in-residence in Oakland, CA each season.

In 2000, Kitka launched the *New Folksongs Commissioning Project*, which engages some of the most exciting voices in contemporary music to create works that utilize Kitka's wide-ranging sound palette. To date, Kitka has premiered more than 35 new works by established and emerging composers including Pauline Oliveros, Chen Yi, Dan Cantrell, Marcel Khalife, David Lang, Linda Tillery, Raif Hyseni, Thilo Reinhardt, Janika Vandervelde, Mariana Sadovska, Richard Einhorn, and Meredith Monk.

Kitka's unique sound and innovative sense of programming has led to dozens of other collaborations, ranging from a reconstruction of the medieval "Carmina Burana" for CalPerformances, to work with Hollywood composers on film soundtracks. Other collaborations of note include creating the role of the Greek Chorus in ACT's *Hecuba*; the creation of *Women in Black*, a multi-disciplinary work with AXIS Dance Company; *Songs from Mama's Table*, with Linda Tillery and the Cultural Heritage Choir, and the vocal-theater work *The Rusalka Cycle: Songs Between the Worlds* (music by Mariana Sadovska, stage direction by Ellen Sebastian Chang).

Kitka has released 11 acclaimed CD recordings, most recently *Cradle Songs*. The film *Kitka and Davka in Concert: Old and New World Jewish Music* has been broadcast on more than 100 PBS stations and has been an award-winning selection at film festivals from Beijing to Toronto.

RESIDENCY ACTIVITIES

Vocal Ensemble Workshops/Masterclasses (1-3 hours)

Kitka collaborates with choral directors and ensembles to incorporate songs from Eastern European folk traditions into the participating ensemble's performance repertoire. Using specialized warm-up techniques, Kitka singers introduce "open voice" singing techniques, offer pronunciation and stylistic guidance, and share cultural and historical background information on each song. These fun and intensive workshops pass along a rich repertoire of beautiful, powerful, and fun-to-sing pieces that are sure to become favorites of singers and audiences alike.

Open Your Voice: An Introduction to Balkan and Slavic Folk Singing (1-3 hours)

An engaging introduction to the powerfully resonant "village style" songs of Bulgaria, Croatia, Ukraine, Russia, Serbia, Georgia, and surrounding regions. Participants will explore the mechanics of "open voice" singing and ornamentation while learning to produce the sweet and strident sounds and compelling harmonies and dissonances that make Kitka's repertoire unique.

Young People's Programs (45 minutes to 1 hour)

Kitka offers a lively, participatory school assembly program for K-12 students exploring the Eastern European "open voice" and the lush harmonies, intricate ornamentation, odd-metered rhythms, and resonant strength of traditional Balkan and Slavic women's a cappella music. Through love songs, laments, work songs and play songs, historical songs, lullabies, healing songs, and songs in praise of nature, Kitka's singers share colorful stories that vividly portray Eastern European village life.

Lecture/Demonstration (1 hour)

An informal musical and cultural overview of the evolution of Balkan and Slavic women's ensemble singing. Topics include uses of music in ritual and everyday life, variations in national styles, and culturally specific rhythmic and harmonic structures. Kitka singers will demonstrate various "open voice" vocal techniques through a stirring selection of songs drawn from their current performance repertoire.

Open Rehearsal (1-2 hours)

A behind-the-scenes look at how Kitka prepares material for performance.

Balkan Dance/Song Workshop (1 hour)

An opportunity to learn odd-metered Balkan rhythms and melodies through traditional folk dances.

Kitka Community Sing (2 hours)

Singers of all ages and levels of experience are invited to join voices with Kitka in a celebratory circle of song. Kitka will lead the group in fun "open voice" warm-ups and will teach accessible, interesting, and beautiful tunes from their repertoire.








